Dean is now the primary surgeon at several hospitals in the Bay Area and shares duties at many others.



Dr. Dean Filipowicz is published in several veterinary journals, has co-authored book chapters and has spoken at various conventions and symposiums. His Master's research investigated a novel type of orthopedic fixation which has since become the gold standard in human orthopedics. Dean's special interests include fracture management, sports medicine, oncologic and reconstructive surgery and minimally invasive surgery.

Approved requests will be reported to the state veterinarian. The link to the forms with an FAQ sheet to address your questions will be available shortly; these will be mailed to veterinarians. This looks like a great solution to the incomplete requests we get at this time. Please let us know if you have questions!



Part Wolf - All Business

A 120-pound canine cross between a wolf and a Malamute is a formidable foe. A squad of these wolf-dog hybrids work nights at the Louisiana State Penitentiary and nobody has yet tried to overpower or outrun them. Inmates are keenly aware of the four-legged security force prowling the perimeter of the 18,500 acre prison grounds. The wolf-dogs were brought in last year in response to a steady decline in the prison's annual budget. The prison, known as Angola, has laid off 105 of its 1200 officers and now 35 of its 42 guard towers stand empty. The wolf-dogs are a strong psychological deterrent and they also save money. They patrol an area between a pair of 15-foot interior and exterior fences topped with razor wire. No prisoner has dared to test the system. How do you train a wolf-dog? "Very carefully and with lots of hot dogs!" said their trainer.

Military Working Dogs To Be Promoted

Since World War I, military working dogs have been in use and their numbers continue to increase. German Shepherds, Labradors and Belgian Malinois are usually preferred. Dogs have abilities that are unmatched by even the most well-trained human soldier. A dog named *Cairo* accompanied Seal Team Six on the raid that killed Osama Bin Laden. In saving countless lives, these canines have also become casualties. A bi-partisan proposal introduced in both the House and Senate "*The Canine Members of the Armed Forces Act.*" would reclassify military dogs as "canine members of the armed forces" instead of "equipment." It would establish a recognition system for military working dogs killed in the line of duty and commendable service awards for extraordinary bravery on the part of a military dog. The legislation would also set up a nonprofit organization to provide medical care for retired military animals. It's about time!

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
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THE GOLDEN RETRIEVER LIFETIME STUDY

Golden Retrievers across the nation are joining what is likely to become one of the most important studies ever conducted in veterinary medicine. *Morris Animal Foundation* recently launched the "Golden Retriever Lifetime Study" to investigate the genetic, nutritional and environmental contributors to cancer in dogs.

Golden Retriever owners from throughout the contiguous United States can enroll their dogs in this long-term observational study. To be included, Golden Retrievers under 2 years of age will undergo a thorough screening process that includes an extensive health questionnaire, veterinary examination and collection of biological samples to ensure that they are healthy.

DRUG BLOCKS VIRUS REPLICATION

Scientists in Colorado have developed a drug that could stop <u>West Nile</u>, <u>Dengue and Yellow Fever</u> viruses from replicating. The drug binds to a protein that's critical for viral replication and blocks its function. The molecule that researchers found is able to reduce virus replication in cells by more than 1,000-fold. The researchers have filed a provisional patent to commercialize this technology.
